


### **Migratory Bird Treaty Act**

- Supports habitat for 350 bird species














## Protect Roadless Rule in the Tongass

- Provides critical habitat for birds, salmon, and other wildlife
- Represents 44% of the stored carbon in National Forests
- Home to the Haida, Tlingit, and Tsimshian Peoples

Top Strongholds represent top 20% of ecosystem type Supporting Strongholds represent next 20% of ecosystem type







### Strong Protections for Birds Address the Loss of 3 Billion Birds




### **Greater Sage-Grouse Protections**

- ANWR is sacred land to the Gwich'n Nation and critical wildlife habitat


#### **Invest in the Future**
